100 years of Bargara Golf Club

Introduction

In the early 1900's Bargara (it was called Sandhills until 1918) comprised a number of weekend shacks and houses as well as the Sandhills Hotel owned by the Bauer Family which was originally situated on land opposite the present clubhouse.

Golf was introduced to Bargara in 1923 by four bachelors, Charles Ferris, Murray Crammond, R. Jackson and Emil Christensen. While spending weekends at local Bundaberg dentist, Joe Gruter's shack they decided to try to play golf. Charles Ferris had a set of clubs so they put a few jam tins down in the centre of unformed road reserves and started to play.

Joe Gruter became interested and he convened a meeting of local property owners and suggested forming a club. In 1924 it was agreed to and Joe Gruter was elected first president and Charles Ferris captain.

Land was purchased from several owners as well as some donated and a nine hole course was laid out. The early fairways followed the old unformed road reserves and unlike other clubs in the area the first greens from the start were grass and not sand, although they had to have barbed wire around them to keep Horrie Bauer's cows off the putting surfaces.

To ensure the club's finances were sound in 1928 debentures were issued and subscribed by resident members, allowing the club to purchase additional land

The land to the south which included Moneys Creek and the lagoon was crown land which was held in trust for the Bargara Golf by Garnet Buss and others. All the road reserves on the course were still technically crown land

During the 1950's Bargara member, Jack Nielsen's brother who was a Brisbane barrister working for the government, organized the permanent closure of all the road reserves on the golf course. The government at the time transferred the road reserve land as well as the Moneys Creek lagoon to the club free of charge.

This, along with all the other donated land, gave the Bargara Golf Club a great start in its early years.

In 1926 Garnet Buss was elected president and he held this position until 1953 and during this time he became the most influential driving force behind the development of the club.

The Evolution of the Bargara Golf Course

All the holes were named and the first was called "Dingley Dell" after the home of dentist Basil Burkett which was adjacent to the first fairway. It was a good 380-metre Par four with the tee on the hill opposite the existing clubhouse and the green was just in front of the existing green and behind a fairway bunker.

The second was called "Sahara" due to the high sand dune in front of the tee. It had a ladder beside the tee so that players could see when the fairway in front of the dune was clear. Later, chicken wire was laid across the dune to help players walk through the loose sand.

Once the club established its original nine-hole layout it remained in operation until the 1950's when an extra nine holes were established.

Another hazard on this hole was the fact that water would run out of the dune after heavy rain and make the fairway on the other side extremely swampy and many a ball was lost when it plugged underground. At 350 metres it was shorter than the eleventh hole today with the tee beside the existing Ladies tee and the green in the same position. The third hole was a par four named the "Road Hole" because it ran along Bauer Street. Another 350-metre par four, this hole almost always played into the wind and the tee was where the existing ladies' twelfth tee is. The green was straight down the fairway almost to the boundary line.

"Ti Trees" was the name given to the fourth hole due to the abundance of large melaleuca trees in that area of the course providing the only obstacle on an otherwise easy hole. A 290-metre par four, the tee was on an allotment on the sand dune across the road from the course proper and the green where the existing thirteenth green is.

The fifth hole was the "Turkeys Nest" whose name came from the shape of the green which was like a large scrub turkey's nest. The design of the green was a copy of the "Wasp's Nest" at Gleneagles in Scotland and was brought to the club by Garnet Buss following one of his many overseas trips. This hole was a short par four measuring 220 metres, with the tee where the existing fourteenth tee is and the green where the existing fifth green is.

This was followed by the "Cup" named because of the shape of the green which had raised edges on the sides and back. It was a 145-metre par three which always was tough when playing into the southeast wind. The tee was where the existing fourth tee is situated and the green was in the same position as the existing seventh.

Next was "Lavista" so named because of the position of the tee which was on the highest part of the golf course with a view of most of the links and the ocean immediately behind the tee. A par five of 490 metres, the hole went from a tee on a sand dune where the Don Pancho resort is now. It followed the existing eighth fairway past the present position of the eighth green until a dogleg right to a green in the same position as the existing fourth green.

"The Oaks" was named because of the large clump of beach sheoak (casuarina equisetifolia) along the side of the fairway. The only par five on the layout, it was 420 metres, with the tee, close to the existing 18th tee and the green in approximately the same position as of the existing ninth green.

Last hole was the "Home" whose name came from the fact that the original clubhouse was right beside the green. A 200-metre par three with the tee beside the existing tenth fairway at the end of See Street. The green was on land opposite the existing clubhouse where the Basalt Estate is now built.

Another feature on the layout was the Woongarra Tramway which cut across the second, fourth and later the fifth holes. Until this section of the tramway was closed in 1948 trains used to run across the course four times a day on their way to and from the Pemberton Grange juice mill.

An Extra Nine Holes

In the late 1940's Deputy President of the club, Les Brady, played a round with Stan Keanea, who was a former state champion. Keanea was impressed with the rugged land to the south of the course between the high sand dune on the beach front and Moneys Creek lagoon.

With the help of a leading professional, Reg Want, five holes were designed for that land and three more added to the existing layout. These 18 holes was officially opened by the president of the Queensland Golf Council, W. G. Duncan, on December 10, 1950.

The first hole teed off from the present car park near the clubhouse over the area where the Pro Shop is now, to the present 2nd green remembering there was no Miller Street in those days. Two was a par four from the sand dune where Don Pancho is now, to the existing 1st green.

1950 Opening

Three was the same as the existing 6th this was then followed by a short par three with the green built on the sand dune overlooking the ocean near the mouth of Moneys Creek.


Next, the 5th, was a par four that had a tee on the dune down to a green situated somewhere on the present 7th fairway. Six was another par three up onto the dune. Seven followed and then joined up to the existing layout as a short par four from the dune to the existing 6th green.

Eight was the existing 4th hole and was followed by

nine which was a par five using the existing 9th tee and green. The next four holes were the same as the original nine-hole layout.

Number 14 was a par four that hit off the existing 14th tee going over the gully to a green that is now a turf garden past the existing 16th green. Hole 15 used the existing 17th tee and doglegged right to the original "Turkey Nest" green. This hole played a lot easier as a par four than it did when it was played as a par three.

The final extra hole number 16 was a par three that went straight up the hill to the existing 17th green.



Number 17 was the same as the existing 18th hole and 18 was the "Home Hole" from the nine-hole layout.

Sadly, this exciting new layout only lasted a few years as firstly heavy rains made much of the course unplayable. This period of heavy rainfall was followed by a couple of years of drought which turned the new fairways to the south back into just sand dunes which were impossible to mow with horse drawn gang mowers of the time.

Another factor into the demise of the new layout was

the fact that its main promoter, Les Brady, had moved to his coffee plantation in New Guinea and was not able to foster support to continue with this layout. Later in the 1950's much of the land facing the ocean was sold to a property developer, Alfred Grant.

For the next three years the club played a 14-hole layout with the five holes to the south taken out of play.

The first hole reverted back to the original nine-hole layout. The 10th still hit off from the car park, eleven was

a par three the same as the existing 3rd and twelve was a par three from beside the present 3rd hole to the present 6th green.

The 13th tee was moved to where 8th tee is now and played to the present 1st green and No. 14 was the present 9th hole. To make up 18 holes members used to play one, two, eight and nine again.

Back To 18 Holes

In 1955 it was decided that the club needed to restore the layout back to 18 holes and it was decided that the horse paddock would be utilized to provide three of the extra holes. The first five holes remained the same but the 6th was changed to the present layout of the 17th hole.

The 7th was a par three that used the famed "Turkey Nest" green and was the same distance as the existing 5th hole. Number eight was the existing 4th hole and nine was a par five the same layout as the existing 9th.

Ten tee was moved back on the course in front of the present Pro Shop and played down the practice fairway to the existing 2nd green. Eleven was the existing 3rd hole and twelve was a par three from a tee beside the 3rd hole to the existing 6th green.

Next was the 13th which is the same as the existing 8th hole. First of the new holes, the 14th, was a very short par four from the existing 2nd tee to a green roughly beside large bunker to the right of the 2nd fairway.

Number 15 was a par three from a tee beside the existing 2nd hole to a green beside the existing ladies' 1st tee. A par four followed from the existing 1st ladies' tee and green. 17 was a new par five, created when a new green was built where the existing 18th green is now situated.

The 18th was the original "Home" hole from the ninehole layout. Some of the long-time members of the club would have started their golfing career on this tight but interesting layout.

The Need For One New Hole

In the early 1970's a new problem for the club developed when Woongarra Shire Council decided to build Miller Street between the roundabout in Burkett Street to the intersection of Baxter Street. For a little while players continued to hit across the new bitumen road but after a few cars were hit playing across the road was stopped.

To gain the extra hole it was decided to swap the two nines and bring into play the land between houses on Miller Street and Moneys Creek lagoon. A par five, the 3rd hole was built with a tee just behind the existing 3rd green to a green in front of the existing 6th green.

The 4th is the same layout as the existing 6th hole and layout joined back up with the course at the 5th hole which is now the 8th. From 1924 players had to hit off from a tee the other side of Baxter Street in front of the clubhouse, but now had to move back onto the course.

This shortened the 10th by a substantial distance, so the green was moved back from its original position. Another change that occurred at this time was turning the 12th "Road Hole" into a par five by building a new green further to the right of the original green.

This change meant players could no longer hit across the road from the 13th tee, which was moved back onto the course to its present position. The course then finished on the existing 18th and the par three across the road was taken out of play.

During the 1980's all the greens were progressively changed from blue couch grass to 328 Bermuda, which was green couch. This gave the greens a far smoother putting surface but problems arose later when the local native green couch invaded some greens and proved difficult to eradicate.

New Land and A Practice Fairway

In 1988 the club purchased part of an old cane farm that bordered the 14th hole and Davidson Street and it was envisaged that the club finally be able to have a practice fairway. Course architects Charlie Earp and Paul King were given the job of coming up with a layout.

To obtain the practice fairway the first fairway was taken out of play and the 8th fairway extended back to become the first hole. The 6th hole was extended to the first green and then became the second hole. The par three seventh was taken out of play and the green became the practice green beside the practice fairway.

Before these changes work had finished building three new holes on the new land starting with the 14th, which retained the existing tee. At the bottom of the hill over the gully the hole turned a right angle to head out to an elevated green 372 metres from the tee.

The next hole 15 was a par three at 144 metres and was built along the side of the drain on the border of the new land. Sixteen was a 326-metre par four that had a slight dogleg left around the lake that was formed to obtain the fill for the elevated greens on the new land.

During this time part of the lagoon beside the 6th hole was reclaimed. The fairway was moved further to the right and a new championship tee was built behind the existing tee, giving players a longer water carry. The 7th hole was slightly realigned to try and stop golf balls hitting neighbouring houses.

Right from the start the new 14th hole created controversy with its right angle turn after the drive. This caused the club to bring in another architect, David Burrup, and he came up with the present layout of a par three followed by a par four.

The Clubhouse







The original Bargara Golf Club clubhouse in 1924 was a very humble building. Located on the northern side of Baxter Street adjacent to the current clubhouse and on land donated to the club by Mr Joe Grunter, the initial clubhouse was a small single room with an open verandah along the front.

> It was not long before the club progressed to more auspicious premises. A new clubhouse was constructed in 1930 on land donated to the club by Mrs G L Buss. This site, on top of a hill overlooking the ocean, is still the location of the present clubhouse. Being a frugal organization, the club retained the original clubhouse as a storeroom for many years.

> A popular feature of the new clubhouse was the large dance floor which holds many memories for past and present members. A more controversial feature was the provision of a member's room which women were not allowed to enter. This room occupied the ocean end of the clubhouse and so the men commanded the best views.

> This room also contained the bar which was located in the same area as the current bar. Any lady golfer or visitor sat at tables located on the dance floor and obtained bar service through a hole in the wall. These arrangements prevailed until the early 1950's. Now, with the age of equality, our lady members enjoy the same amenities as the men.

The original entry steps to the Clubhouse were inscribed with the words BARGARA GOLF HOUSE. During 1942, with Australia under threat of Japanese invasion, the Security Section of Army Intelligence removed the word BARGARA as a safeguard against alerting invading forces of their whereabouts.

BARGARA was never permanently replaced although there are a number of post war photos showing the full inscription. These photos were taken with the name painted on the steps. In recognition of their historical significance, these steps were retained in

the 1997 reconstruction of the clubhouse. Due to workplace health and safety concerns these steps have now been covered up.

From 1930 through to the 1960's a number of extensions were made to the clubhouse to provide enhanced amenities for the members. These included extensions to the western end to provide additional space and the construction of men's and ladies' rest rooms.

In 1965 the clubhouse experienced a major remodelling with the addition of an extension on the southern side. This extension effectively doubled the size of the existing building and provided for a new bar area and liquor storeroom.

Planning commenced in 1992 for the construction of a new clubhouse. As planning progressed it became obvious that the most cost-effective approach would be to retain as much of the existing floor and external wall sections as possible. The Board finally agreed on a plan that saved all of the existing concrete floor and utilized approximately 35% of the existing external wall sections.

The plan provided for a complete renewal of the inside of the clubhouse as well as additional toilet facilities for a function room and a large deck overlooking the ocean. After a selective tendering process, a local building contractor, Jeff Lennox, was awarded the contract for a fixed price of \$805,000 plus approved variations. The cost variations of the project were stringently supervised by the Board with the total project building cost coming in at \$828,000 – a great result for the club.

The reconstruction of the clubhouse presented a number of challenges to the builder Jeff Lennox. As the club wished to keep trading in the clubhouse while it was being rebuilt, Lennox had to schedule his work around competition days and major events. A prime requirement was to keep the bar and poker machines operational.

There were many days when the quiet solitude of the 19th hole was interrupted by concrete saws, jackhammers and such. As construction progressed and the old clubhouse was demolished, there were many surprises behind the coverstrips. The rubber on most of the old electrical wiring had perished and it was a miracle that the ceiling hadn't caught fire. A number of structural areas of the old building would have been seriously challenged if a cyclone of any forced had struck Bargara. It was clearly evident that the old clubhouse was well past its use by date.

Work on the new clubhouse started in late January 1997 and the major part of the contract was completed by 7th July 1997. The new clubhouse was officially opened on 16 August 1997 by Mr John Thorsen, President of the Queensland Golf Union. That night 365 members and guests celebrated the opening at a gala dinner dance. Jeff Lennox received a Queensland Master Builders Association award for his work.



On the last Saturday the children are taken out onto the course to play an Ambrose event and familiarise them more with the rules, safety and etiquette of golf play and give them a taste of what it would be like to continue with their new golf skills at the club.

Group sizes are limited to a maximum of eight children for each five-week program to give each child quality time with the Club Professional in an optimum environment to nurture their introduction to the skills of golf.
